Matthew 25:40 And the King will say, 'I tell you the truth, when you did it to one of the least of these my brothers and sisters, you were doing it to me!'

Before kids are old enough even to pronounce it right, we want them to be able to lisp "thank you." A two-year-old's typical vocabulary consists of "no," "no," "no," and "thank you."

Maybe that early indoctrination is the problem. We too easily associate thank you's with a childlike, childhood response, something we think we outgrow as we work hard to do for ourselves and earn our own way. Count how many times you still say thank you in the course of a day.

- When the UPS deliverer brings a bulky package to your door—do you say thank you?
- When the fast-food server hands you your pseudo-food, either through the drive-up window or across the counter—do you still say thank you?
- When someone lets you squeeze into a congested traffic lane—do you still say (mouth) thank you?
- When your kids actually put their clothes in the laundry—do you still say thank you?
- When your spouse pitches in and truly partners in some tedious task—do you still say thank you?

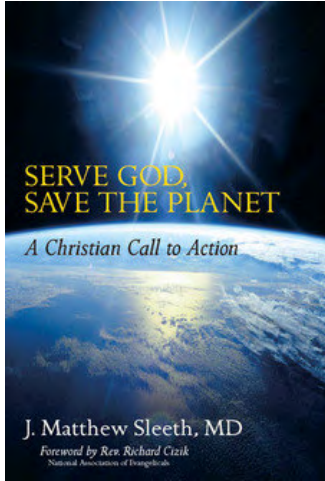

Help Write Our Devotions!

Advent is the time preceding Christmas, beginning four Sundays before December 25. It is a Latin word meaning “coming.” The Old Testament teaches us about Jesus, the savior who was to come. We anticipate the celebration of the birth of Jesus, the Son of God, who came into this world so that our sins may be forgiven. We also anticipate the second coming of Jesus, when he returns to Earth, which we know through faith marks the beginning of our eternal life with Jesus.

Of course, Jesus comes to us everyday, into our hearts and lives as we pray, study his Word, and live as Jesus’ followers.

We are going to publish our own Advent Devotional Booklet this year, filled with scripture, stories, and prayers designed to help us grow closer to Jesus as we anticipate his birth. We need help!

- When you realize you can walk, see, hear, breath, cry, laugh, and love—do you still say thank you?



Our twenty-first century lives are "enriched" with more conveniences and conveyances than our ancestors could have ever imagined. We have microwaves, DVD's, and Internet connections to everything and anything. Instant-messaging and cell-phones keep us in constant contact with the world while our home and car security systems keep us protected and isolated from it.

But somehow all this "enrichment" has a way of becoming just so much manure that we find ourselves slogging through every day. We aren't grateful for it. We don't give thanks for it. We don't even con-

sider it except when it breaks down or messes up, thus inconveniencing our schedules and routines.

Maybe the first step toward re-awakening thank you's in life is to follow novelist Alice Walker's advice: "Expect nothing. Live frugally on surprise." Walker offers sensible and time-sensitive practicality to this general suggestion. To expect nothing may mean not taking for granted that your car will start when you turn the key. Try this and you will be surprised by a marvel of technology worthy of sincere gratitude.

- Did you breathe a thank you this morning when your car started to get you here?
- Did you breathe a thank you when you arrived here in church without a flat tire?
- Did you breathe a thank you this second as your body both produced and destroyed 15 million red blood cells? Fifteen million old ones destroyed and the same amount of new ones produced! Every second!

Scientist Robert A. Emmons, in an article on "The Joy of Thanks," considers the physical and psychological benefits of thankfulness to be almost equal to that of therapy: "My colleagues and I are finding that gratitude, which we define as a felt sense of wonder, thankfulness, and appreciation for life, is more than simply a pleasant emotion to experience or a polite sentiment to express. It's, or at

least can be, a basic disposition, one that seems to make lives happier, healthier, more fulfilling -- and even longer." (Spirituality & Health, 4 [Winter 2002], 38ff.)

According to Emmons, recent psychological research shows that:

A person experiencing gratitude is protected from the destructive impulses of envy and greed.

The practice of gratitude as a spiritual discipline may cure excessive materialism and its attendant negative emotions of envy, resentment, disappointment, and bitterness.

Gratitude supports well-being by displacing resentment, regret, and other psychological states deleterious to long-term happiness.

Grateful people experience higher levels of positive emotions—happiness, vitality, optimism, and hope—and greater satisfaction with life. In other words, Thanksgiving could also be called Thankstherapy. Our national holiday of Thanksgiving is one of our country's better habits. It's a peculiarly national festival not shared by most other countries. It's the holiday driven by the least amount of commercialization. It's the holiday I like best.

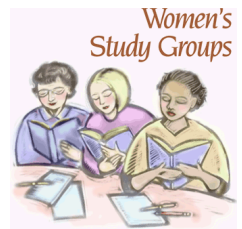

Ellen's Run/ Walk a Success

More than \$45,000 was raised during Ellen's Run. The 5K race/walk was held in honor of Ellen Schneider and benefited two charities in which Ellen was very active: the Mental Health Association of Montgomery County and the Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School. A Black Robe?

From Andy Adams, our Minister of Youth, Young Adults & Community Care:

You might be curious why I wear a black robe on Sunday morning while Richard and Pastor Marv both wear a white robe. There are several reasons why I wear black.

1. I am seeking ordination in the Western North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church where the tradition is that most clergy wear black. Most protestant clergy started to wear black in protest to the Anglican and Catholic churches many years ago. They felt that it was important to show independence of those traditions and therefore

chose to wear the opposite of what the Anglican and Catholics wore. Many of my colleagues in the United Methodist Church in the local Annual Conference choose to wear white; many other Protestant clergy choose this, including Pastor Marv. It is simply a matter of personal preference. I choose to show independence of those traditions. I am a very independent free thinker and therefore like showing independence that black symbolizes.

2. Simplicity. You will notice that my black robe is very basic compared to my white robe. This takes the focus off of what I am wearing and back to worshipping God.

3. There are times that it is important that I be uniform and that I wear something similar to what everybody else wears. When those occasions come around I will be wearing white.

4. The white robe reminds of the history that we came from while the black can be thought of as being modern. My intent in wearing the black is not to be controversial but to make people think. I come from a different tradition than the ELCA that many of you may not be familiar with. I welcome your questions concerning some of the ways that I do things. Please contact me any time.
