Unbinding the Gospel: Real Life Evangelism

Unbinding the Gospel is a book for leaders in congregations who want to know the facts about the state of evangelism. It is a book for Christians who want a hopeful, powerful, joy-filled way to learn to share their faith. (It's also a book for people who cringe when they hear the "E" word!) Based on thorough research, sparkling with life and practicality, and steeped in spirituality, this workbook for congregational use has been enthusiastically endorsed by 7 heads of denominations, professors of evangelism, and leading experts, and pastors.

Martha Grace Reese, pastor, attorney and author, interviewed over 1200 pastors, lay leaders and new Christians with a wide range of theological beliefs. Her team visited 50 congregations, combed through statistics and conducted a national survey of leaders and new Christians in 150 mainline congregations that are doing the best statistical job of reaching unchurched people.

The research resulted in Unbinding the Gospel and the upcoming Real Life Evangelism Series, which will help our entire congregation

- begin to discover and further develop their faith, and
- to pray and to start to engage in authentic faith sharing.

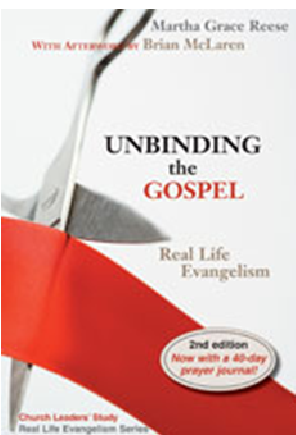

The staff and a small group of leaders in our congregation are about to begin reading and discussing Unbinding the Gospel. Pastor Marv has completed the introductory session offered through the Evangelism team of our local synod. About eight congregations and pastors are going to participate in this new spiritual formation process. The Unbinding the Gospel study doesn't lead to a new program. It is about a spiritual formation process for all people with a hunger to share God's love. 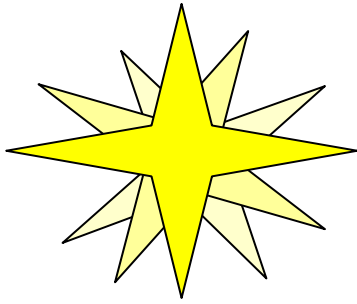

Prayer and Silence

Leviticus 6:12-13 says, “Meanwhile, the fire on the altar must be kept burning; it must never go out. Each morning the priest will add fresh wood to the fire and arrange the daily whole burnt offering on it. He must then burn the fat of the peace offerings on top of this daily whole burnt offering. Remember, the fire must be kept burning on the altar at all times. It must never go out.”

While the previous offerings and sacrifices were ones that the people did, the section from 6:8-7:38 deals with priestly procedure. The burnt offering was presented in the morning and evening for the whole nation (see Exodus 29:38-43). The holy fire on the altar had to keep burning because God had started it. This represented God’s eternal presence in the sacrificial system. It showed the people that only by God’s gracious favor could their sacrifices be acceptable. God’s fire is present in each believer’s life today. He lights the fire when the Holy Spirit comes to live in us, and he tends it so we will grow in grace as we walk with him. When we are aware that God lives in us, we have confidence to come to him for forgiveness and restoration. We can carry out our work with strength and enthusiasm.

With a focused, intentional prayerlife, to keep His fire burning in you, God does light the fire for the Holy Spirit to live in you—so you will obtain His knowledge and ways to grow and experience grace as you walk with Him.

Moravians were the first Protestants. Their movement was 60 years before Martin Luther began his reformation, 100 years before the establishment of the Anglican Church, and nearly 200 years before the origin of Baptists, as we know them. After several hundred years of persecution, the Moravians fled southern Germany and settled in what is now the Czech Republic. In such close quarters, the Moravians began to turn on each other in quarrelling, gossip, slander, offense, and bad feeling. The unity of all the body of believers was beginning to unravel. Zinzendorf cried out to God for direction to save the Moravians. The Lord directed him to this passage and commanded him, “The fire on the altar must burn continuously, it must not go out.” While Zinzendorf prayed, God worked, and brought a great revival of repentance among the Moravians. In the midst of revival, Zinzendorf presented Leviticus 6:13 to the congregation, and they established “Hernhut,” The Lord’s Watch, a 24-hour prayer meeting that lasted for 120 years.

In the 21st Century, we constantly hear the phrase, “an instantaneous society.” Just for 120 seconds, take a

Challenging Lifestyles

Taizé Prayer Services

CELC's fall season is here, and with it a new round of rich offerings to our church community. First, the Challenging Lifestyles group meets every Sunday at 10:15 (between the services) in the Upper Room for our meaningful and varied discussions of how we meet life's everyday challenges—and many that are well beyond the day-to-day routine—using the Bible's teachings, prayer, and support for each other. For the next few months we will be focusing on forgiveness and reconciliation and how these two very important concepts are so central to much that we do in our lives and to understanding conflicts in the world at large. Some of us have watched the powerful DVD "The Power of Forgiveness," and we have plans to show this movie again in the near future. We will also be using

other study materials related to these topics.

The most important feature of Challenging Lifestyles is that each Sunday we are also open to the concerns that participants bring to the session, or to issues raised by the church's weekly Bible passages, and we freely follow any new issues or concerns as needed to serve the group's needs for that moment. We think that this combination of following a general theme, coupled with the flexibility to attend to specific and individual issues as they may occur, makes for a very helpful, interesting, and supportive time together each Sunday. We are open to all and urge you to check us out.

Second, we have also started back with our monthly Taizé prayer and

meditation services (see schedule on page 5). A Taizé service is a simple time of worship with silent prayer, meditation, and songs with a brief scripture reading and message by the service leader. Many of us find it helpful in disengaging from the day's frustrations and fast pace, and a healing experience for the mind and soul. We invite you to join us at these services and experience this important means of enriching your spiritual journey and prayer life.

We take turns leading the morning sessions and everyone readily participates with resulting great different insights. Reading Matthew 18: 21-35 about the unmerciful servant set the stage to begin our exchange of views. Here are some ideas from our discussion that I would like to share.

Did you receive forgiveness from someone recently? Did you forgive someone else? Don't forget you can also forgive yourself when you know you are wrong. After all, If God can forgive us all our errors we should be able to forgive ourselves.



But what is genuine, sincere forgiveness? If we are not contrite and acknowledge our errors, can we be really forgiven? Does that apply to others who may say the words to you, "I am sorry" or "I forgive you," but it is clear to your perception that their words are far from sincere?

And then are there horrible crimes or other offenses that are "unforgivable". What about murder and the Holocaust? If we have difficulty forgiving those events can we at least commit to "trying to forgive them". We cannot pretend to have the power of God who may be the only one who can forgive such sins.

Is it fair to say merely "forgive and forget"? Have you had someone say to you, "Forget it, move on", when you were hurt by their action and expect some form of apology if you are to forgive them? If we really forgive we should be able to move on and not dwell on the

issue. Tormenting yourself with an issue can create greater self-damage, so we need to forgive in the interests of our own health.

Recently in the Men's Group we also read from Luke and Samuel. We found new insights from the parable of the Prodigal Son and about reconciliation from Absalom's reconciliation with King David after Absalom had killed David's son Amnon. We look forward to readings in Genesis where we will learn more about reconciliation and reuniting with loved ones.
